KIDS FAITH QUESTIONS: (Week 4 – Chapters 13-18)

Group Discussion:

- 1) Why do you think Aslan tells the other children not to discuss Edmund's betrayal? ("Here is your brother," he said, "and—there is no need to talk to him about what is past.")
- 2) Compare the way the crowd feels in the presence of Aslan vs the presence of the Witch (page 154).
- 3) Aslan clearly could take the Queen by force. Why doesn't he use it?
- 4) How is Aslan in his manner and actions like Jesus?
- 5) How do the actions at the stone table remind you of Good Friday and Easter?
- 6) How might Edmunds experiences allowed him to grow into a fair and just king?
- 7) Why do you think you cannot return to Narnia the way you came before?

Reflection Questions:

- 1) What did Christ do for all of mankind by giving himself to be crucified?
- 2) What is one thing you need Jesus to help you do in your life?
